Editorial Note

It is appropriate this month to recall that in August 2021 your Parish Council pledged to honour the Armed Forces Covenant and to support the Armed Forces Community.

The key principles of the Covenant are that no member of the Armed Forces Community should face disadvantage in the provision of public and commercial services compared to any other citizen, and that in some circumstances special treatment may be appropriate especially for the injured or bereaved.

Bearing in mind our village's size and demographics, the practical opportunities for implementing those principles in our day-to-day business are inevitably somewhat limited. We can, however, demonstrate our commitment to the Covenant by celebrating the work of the armed forces and encouraging positive interaction between them and members of the public.

As a Council we do that by activities such as promoting and supporting our nearest Royal British Legion branch in Holt. This month, on an individual level, we can do it by supporting Poppy Appeal Day and marking Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday. Simple gestures like wearing a poppy or briefly pausing our daily activities when the clock strikes eleven on those days are a physical demonstration of our gratitude to those who 'for our tomorrow gave their today'.

With remembrance in mind, I have penned an article about the mid-air collision involving two RAF aircraft that occurred over Holt and High Kelling on the 19th August 1968. I am grateful for the thoughts of others on that theme that also appear in this issue of the Chronicle.

Elsewhere we have an update on the Holt and District Community Support Fund (Energy) - *"support for local people by local people"* - that in the short time since it was launched has already raised some £15,000. Hopefully it will help to ease the financial worries of some as winter approaches and energy costs continue to rise. News from your Parish Council includes a tie-up with The Treehouse Community Café in Holt to collect donations for their community fridge, and feedback on the very successful Parish Council Open Meeting that was held on the 18th October. Meanwhile, over at the Village Hall, look out for the Winter Warmer and advance publicity for the ever-popular Christmas Craft Fair on the 26th November.

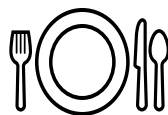

Defibrillator

Some good news! Having acquired the phone box outside the General Store/Post Office for the princely sum of £1, we have now contracted with Community Heartbeat Trust to install a second defibrillator in the village. (The first being at the Village Hall.) We expect this to be installed on the 1st November, after which it can be linked to the NHS and commissioned in due course. Located at a focal point of our village, I'm sure you'll agree this will be a great asset. Training in its use will be available. May I take this opportunity to thank both the former High Kelling Society and the North Norfolk District Council Communities Fund for their generous contributions towards the cost.



Litter-pick and path-clearing

The Parish Council invites villagers to join the beginning-of-winter litter-pick and footpath-clearing which will be taking place on Sunday the 6th November, starting from the Village Hall, from 10am to 12 noon. If numbers permit we will clear debris etc from the 'dog-leg' off Pineheath Road and the pedestrian footpath fronting Voewood. Your Parish Council provides the pickers, hoops and bags. Those taking part will need to wear appropriate clothing, boots and gardening-type gloves, plus a hi-vis jacket if you have one (or we can loan you a vest). Refreshments to follow. A great opportunity to meet fellow villagers as well as tidying up our village.

Standing as a Parish Councillor

The current term of office for Parish Councillors comes to an end in May 2023. It's therefore a good time to start thinking about standing as a High Kelling Parish Councillor. Cost-of living

It's probably fair to say High Kelling villagers are generally better able to cope with the current cost-of-living crises than many living in Holt and other villages in the area. One key indication being the number of free school meals provided. At Holt Community Primary School over 25.5% are so entitled, well above the national average of 17%. The Holt-based Treehouse Community Café runs a Community Fridge which allows those in need to take what they require, without referral, voucher, or being confined to a standard pack etc. There is no evidence that this flexibility is in any way abused. The Parish Council's Open Day

I am writing this article immediately following the Parish Council's Open Day at the Village Hall on the 18th October. I hope everyone agreed this was a success. Regrettably there was an unavoidable clash with the funeral of a villager but attendance was very encouraging at around 50. Martin Fulcher, a Director at North Norfolk District Council (NNDC), led a most interesting and informative question/answer/comment session on planning issues and the planning process itself. This was followed by an outline of the financial support available for energy-saving initiatives by Dulcie Walsh, and Claire Chapman talked about her role as a Community Connector. Sarah Bristow from the Norfolk Association of Local Councils spoke about encouragement for people to put themselves forward as prospective Parish Councillors. Our District and County Councillor, Cllr Eric Vardy, was on hand to answer questions and comment. Village Hall Trustee Sean Doran outlined the Village Hall's green plans, all part of its Big Plan proposals.

I can't do justice in such a short article to the issues debated during the lively discussion; these will appear in due course in a future edition of the Parish Chronicle. But in outline the topics raised included:

- the planning process, housing provision and NNDC'S District Plan;
- working towards making High Kelling a greener village in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty;
- installing solar panels;
- preference for hedges rather than fences as front boundaries;
- developing a Neighbourhood Plan to maintain the character of High Kelling;
- the possible funding of village improvement projects via any new developments;
- the potential for future development, with particular reference to the former Pineheath Care Home and nursery sites, Mattocks Field and the land between Kelling Hospital and Holt Station;
- the difficulty presented by trees on private land in relation to improving sight-lines for accessing the A148;
- improving the 'dog-leg' between Pineheath Road and the A148 through planting and clearance of debris;
- Norfolk County Council's Million Trees for Norfolk offer (see Norfolk.gov.uk)
- becoming a Parish Councillor

Your Parish Council will be discussing each and every issue raised during the meeting and, where appropriate and practicable, including them in the High Kelling Parish Plan for 2022-23.

I should like to thank everyone who came to Cromer Crematorium on 18 October to help me pay tribute to my husband, Rob Wilson. A man who was an inspiration to us all – he never complained about what life had thrown at him and always had a twinkle in his eye and a smile on his face, and usually a bottle of beer in his hand. Rob was positive, funny and radiated friendliness.

Rob was diagnosed with oral cancer for the second time shortly after moving to High Kelling. He made a good recovery and threw himself into making home and garden improvements and participating in village events; running golf games at the Summer Fayres, quiz night (our team was called *The Champions* but we lost!), sharing his family's war time memorabilia for the VE celebrations, being a regular at the Village Hall's pub nights where he was well known for his *Bish, Bash, Bosh* whisky, and playing Santa at the Christmas Fayre.

Cancer returned earlier this year but Rob could not be cured. He continued to fight but he did not bounce back as he had always done before – he had lost the twinkle in his eyes and the smile on his face - and sadly passed away on 29 September. He will be missed but not forgotten.

Cost-of-Living Crisis

We're all feeling the effects of the cost-of-living crisis these days - whether it's heating our homes, fuel for our cars, buying the basics at the supermarket or increases in mortgage interest rates. Although we tend to think of ours as being a relatively prosperous area, the reality is that 25% of the pupils at Holt Primary School are eligible for free school meals.

For some people, this winter could well involve a choice between heating and eating. More and more people are relying on charities, churches, food banks and community initiatives to get by.

The Treehouse Community Café in Holt has a community fridge and makes food and some toiletries and household items available to those in need. For more information see their website or pop along for a tea or coffee and cake.

The Village Hall has kindly agreed to be a collection point for donations to the Treehouse. If you would like to make one, there will be a box in the hall foyer starting Friday 4th November and thereafter on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings. But please try not to disturb groups using the Hall.

Items wanted include:

Food: Long-life milk (full fat or semi-skimmed); fruit; vegetables; tinned fish; tinned meat; tinned vegetables; pasta sauce; tinned rice pudding; squash/fruit juice; biscuits; cuppa-soup/mugshot.

Household & toiletries: Laundry detergent; washing-up liquid; nappies; shampoo; deodorant; toilet rolls.

Most local supermarkets also collect food and other items for food banks. If we all add just one item every time we do our shopping it will make a huge difference.

Thank you for your support in these difficult times.

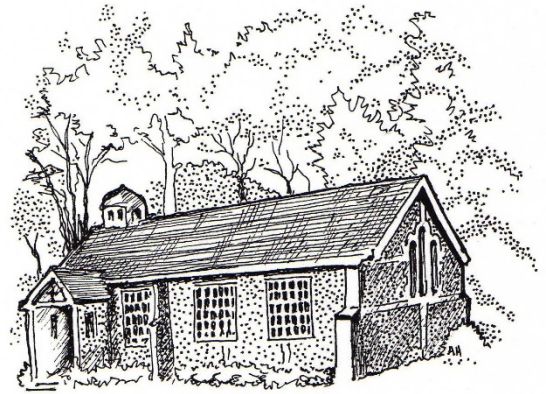

Community Speed Watch (still) seeks volunteers

The Norfolk Police supports local communities who want to have some influence over traffic speed on their patch. We have run a Community Speed Watch group in High Kelling for some years now. You may have seen us, when three residents stand beside the A148 in their hi-viz jackets, targeting speeding vehicles with a radar gun and noting down their registration numbers.

The details are sent to the police who, after confirming the details provided, send an advisory letter to each offender. During an hour's activity we commonly monitor between 800 to 1100 passing vehicles. More importantly, hopefully, they see us - creating a heightened awareness to the fact that they are passing through a residential area where a speed limit is in place that we expect to be observed.

Ideally we would undertake the Speed Watch at least once a week but it is increasingly difficult to do so with the limited number of volunteers we currently have to man the rota. Whilst we wouldn't claim that it's going to be the highlight of your week, it's not an onerous task - just one hour once in a while is all we're looking for.

Remembering the mid-air collision over Holt and High Kelling

Living in this part of the country, the rumble and roar of military aircraft undertaking training in the skies above us is a regular reminder of those who serve in our armed forces. To some it's a curse, while others regard it as the necessary price we pay for our nation's freedoms and the protection of our way of life. Or as the bumper sticker puts it: *"Jet noise: the sound of freedom"*.

At this time of year we remember those who have died in the service of their country. A very visible reminder of that sacrifice is the war memorial located in Holt Market Place where a Remembrance Sunday commemoration takes place on the second Sunday in every November. Rather less prominently, a memorial stone located behind the choir stalls in St Andrew's Church reminds us that not all casualties occur during actual conflict. It is dedicated to the memory of the seven members of the Royal Air Force who died in a mid-air collision over Holt and High Kelling on the 19th August 1968.

Two aircraft were involved. One, a Victor tanker, was climbing away from its base at Royal Air Force Station Marham; the other, a Canberra bomber was returning to its base at Royal Air Force Station Bruggen (in what was then West Germany) after completing a practice run over the Wainfleet Range off the Lincolnshire coast. The last words heard from the captain of the Victor were "I'm at 13,500 feet and climbing". The two aircraft collided at approximately 10.10pm at an estimated height of 15,000 feet. Sadly, all the crew members on board - four in the Victor and three in the Canberra - were killed.

Heavy cloud and thunderstorms were present in the area at the time, which a subsequent Board of Inquiry concluded had rendered the radar cover inadequate. Fortunately, the Victor was not involved in a refuelling exercise so was not carrying additional fuel and the Canberra had already dropped its practice bomb.

Even so, witnesses on the ground reported seeing a huge fireball in the sky and wreckage from both aircraft started to fall over a wide area. A 10-year-old boy holidaying with his grandparents in Vale Road at the time describes seeing an RAF team being in position on the corner of Vale Road/Cromer Road and co-ordinating the initial response. A large wing flap was found in a field on the corner of Cromer Road/ Selbrigg Road and another large piece of wreckage in a tree next to the track

behind Bernard Close leading to Bridge Road. Smaller pieces of wreckage were liberally scattered elsewhere and were apparently still being dug up in the garden years later.

Further afield, a burning aircraft cockpit fell into a cornfield on the outskirts of Holt. An airman's body fell into a young tree in Holt Country Park, its trunk still deformed to this day by the impact. (It is now the site of another memorial to the incident.) A helmet and a wad of scorched papers were discovered on the playing fields of Gresham School, while in Gravel Pit Lane part of a wing crashed into a garden and another piece of wreckage demolished a shed. But despite the huge amount of burning debris that fell in the area there were no casualties on the ground, although as Fr Howard observed at a service commemorating the fiftieth anniversary of the collision, Holt's miracle in this respect was somebody else's tragedy.



The crew of the Handley Page Victor XH646 comprised Flight Lieutenant William Gallienne (Aircraft Captain), Flying Officer Roger Morton (Co-pilot), Squadron Leader Michael Doyle (Navigator) and Flight Lieutenant Kenneth Peacock (Navigator). 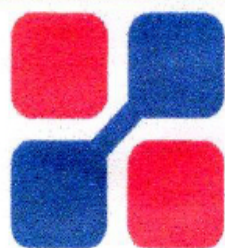
